- **Practice everyday situations:** Use German for introductions, ordering food, asking questions, and daily conversations.

■ 80/20 Rule in German Words

Instead of memorizing long and random vocabulary lists, begin with the German words that appear frequently in real conversations. Prioritize pronouns, common verbs, question words, numbers, time expressions, and everyday nouns.

■ Essential German Verbs

- **sein** – to be
- **haben** – to have
- **werden** – to become
- **können** – can / to be able to
- **machen** – to do / make
- **gehen** – to go
- **kommen** – to come
- **wollen** – to want
- **brauchen** – to need

■ 80/20 Rule in German Phrases

German Phrase	English Meaning
Wie geht es dir?	How are you?
Ich verstehe nicht.	I don't understand.
Können Sie mir helfen?	Can you help me?
Wie viel kostet das?	How much does that cost?
Wo ist der Bahnhof?	Where is the train station?
Ich möchte...	I would like...

■ 80/20 Rule in German for Beginners

For beginners, the best approach is to build a strong foundation before moving to complicated vocabulary and advanced grammar.

- 1 **Step 1:** Learn greetings and basic introductions.
- 2 **Step 2:** Memorize common everyday words.
- 3 **Step 3:** Learn the most useful German verbs.
- 4 **Step 4:** Practice simple sentence structures.
- 5 **Step 5:** Learn common questions and answers.
- 6 **Step 6:** Listen to German every day.
- 7 **Step 7:** Speak using short and practical sentences.

■ Focus on the Most Useful Grammar

You do not need to master every German grammar rule immediately. Start with the grammar that helps you create useful sentences. Focus on personal pronouns, present tense verbs, basic word order, articles such as **der**, **die**, **das**, and common modal verbs.

Instead of: Trying to memorize 100 random German words in one day.

Try: Learning 20 useful words and using them repeatedly in sentences and conversations.
